# **CRISIS CENTER**

StarVista's Crisis Center offers multiple crisis intervention and suicide prevention services: StarVista's 24/7 Crisis Hotline 650-579-0350, Teen Crisis Services, Clinical Services, Educational Presentations, Health Ambassador Program – Youth (HAP-Y), and volunteering program.

The Crisis Center is contracted with all the schools in San Mateo County to provide short-term therapy for students during or after a crisis occurs. In addition, we offer different psycho-educational services.

We view crisis as any incident or situation that causes great distress in a student, so much so that their functioning at school or home declines. We provide presentations for students, staff members, and parents around different topics such as suicide prevention, mental health, bullying, healthy coping skills, and student stress reduction.

Lastly, we have the Health Ambassador Program for Youth (HAP-Y), where San Mateo County youth 16-24 years old can take part in learning about common challenges in mental wellness, signs and risks of suicide, suicide prevention, and how to access mental health services.

"We're in this together" is a phrase we tell each other every day at the Crisis Center. We all need support, and we all remind each other that we are there to step in. Crisis looks different for everyone. What is unique about the Crisis Center is our adaptability and flexibility with change. We meet the clients and community where they are.

In March 2020, I was booked for one full day of presentations, which amounted to about 6 presentations in one school day. During workshops, I do my best to make an effort to disclose some of my own personal experiences with the topics presented because I find that connecting to others means being vulnerable and open.

In one of the last presentations of the day, I had a student send me a private message in the Zoom chat thanking me for being so honest yet informative about the topics surrounding mental health and suicide prevention.

The young high schooler said, "Being a Latina and having mental health issues is challenging, but you've given me so many tools. I've learned to be okay with not being okay. I am not alone. Thank you so much, Vero."

It is rewarding to be a part of such an incredible team that strives to provide students and community members with the tools and language surrounding mental health topics and making the effort to seek support.



The Crisis Center answers an average of 35.8 calls per day.

# **HEALTHY HOMES**

StarVista's Healthy Homes program serves families with children ages 0-5 who are facing a variety of stressors in their lives.

We strive to prevent child abuse and neglect, enhance the parent-child relationship, and reduce the impact of risk factors such as systemic racism, traumatic experiences, poverty, food insecurity, substance abuse, domestic violence, mental illness, and language barriers, among others.

Our services include psychotherapy for children and their caregivers, parent-child activity groups, parent education and support groups, father/male caregivers case management and support groups and workshops on a variety of topics related to development, parenting and healthy relationships.

Our Healthy Homes team shared some challenges similar to what our clients were facing during the pandemic. While most of our staff had to navigate new obstacles, both in their work and personal lives, our commitment to our clients' wellbeing and health remained the same, if not more.

58% of Healthy Homes clients speak Spanish as their primary language.



With modification of services, we worked together with clients to make sure our services continued to support and adapt to their needs, especially when they needed us most.

In 2020, a family was referred to Healthy Homes for child-parent psychotherapy and case management support. There were four children in the family, Two were 3 and under. The family needed support with case management to access pro-bono legal guidance for their immigration status, preschool placement for the children, housing, financial support, healing past traumas, and positive parenting.

Dad was referred for case management services with our Father's Support Specialist for help with referral for services that could help navigate legal status for himself, wife, and eldest daughter.

He was also invited to our father support group, Dad's Hangout, to be able to learn about fatherhood topics and strengthening his parenting skills while sharing his fathering experience with other male caregivers.

## Mom was referred to Healthy Homes' Mother Support Group.

Mom attended a few sessions, and the Family Specialist was able to connect with her and other Moms and worked on The Circle of Security Parenting Curriculum, a model that promotes a secure attachment in children and helps caregivers to connect with the children in their lives and better their understanding of the children's needs.

Mom started working with a Healthy Homes Mental Health Clinician in looking at the children's development, doing developmental screenings, processing past trauma, getting support with distance learning for her elementary school children, getting help accessing San Mateo County services such as Medi-Cal and Cal Fresh, and receiving support in her pregnancy and through the birth of her 5th child.

In December, the family members, including their newborn, contracted Covid-19 and needed emergency shelter, as they did not want to infect the other residents in their shared home. Mom reached out immediately to our Mental Health Clinician for help.

Healthy Homes contacted many agencies for assistance, and our Father Support Specialist contacted the Human Service Agency (HSA) in East Palo Alto to consult about the situation. HSA was able to place the family on the list to receive a 14-day hotel voucher due to the emergency situation.

The family received the voucher to isolate temporarily, received three meals a day and their health was monitored by San Mateo County and Stanford Hospital.

Healthy Homes communicated often with the family to help them with their needs and to check on their medical condition.

In addition, Healthy Homes was able to obtain diapers and wipes and delivered them to the family for the youngest children a few times.

Healthy Homes signed the family up to receive holiday presents from StarVista's annual gift drive and fortunately, they were discharged on Christmas Eve to be in their home to celebrate a holiday very dear to them.

## Healthy Homes will continue to work with the family.

We will be providing mental health therapy and concrete services including, but not limited to, referrals for preschool programs, diaper services, housing resources, and job train services so the family can emotionally and physically heal and access their capacity as loving parents and strong members of our community.

# DAYBREAK

Daybreak is StarVista's housing and independent living skills training program for homeless youth ages 16-21 that provides homeless youth the skills and resources they need to live on their own.

Participants receive training in obtaining/ maintaining employment, money management, accessing educational training and community resources, locating housing, and more.

Nicole\* entered Daybreak in September of 2019 after being referred by a high school counselor when they were made aware she was homeless. She was displaying behaviors that were out of character due to her instability at home. She disclosed what was happening with her family, discussed her homeless status and was given knowledge of Daybreak services. After being referred to the Core Agency and being placed, she joined the Daybreak community.

Nicole left home at the age of 17 and had been experiencing homelessness on and off ever since she entered Daybreak. She was a victim of childhood neglect and was taught at an early age that she would need to rely on herself for support. She found ways to survive but did not have the childhood or adolescence a young person deserves.

As soon as Nicole first entered Daybreak, it was obvious she was motivated and eager to achieve her dreams.

On her second day in our program, she decided to change high schools to an adult school close to our home. She had fallen behind at her regular high school and knew she needed a different curriculum to graduate. She declined the credit reduction students can receive if they have homeless status and this showed our staff how driven she was.

She had established goals, kind values, and authentic genuineness in the hope for good. She blessed our community with knowledge, resources, community events, educational opportunities, and a passion for social change. She was open to utilizing all the services our program connected her to. She found safety in the relationships she built with our staff and began to break some of the walls down she was taught to keep her safe.

At Daybreak, she was given a space to focus on herself and her passions.

She no longer had to pick up the pieces of her broken family and could live life as her authentic self. During her time at Daybreak she graduated high school, enrolled in college, continued to work on creating healthy familial relationships and was connected with mental health and AOD services.

Nicole transitioned from Daybreak in September to move into a rental with StarVista's Rapid Re-Housing subsidy help. She is tremendously grateful. She saved a substantial amount of money while living in our program and intends to use those funds while she completes her life goals. She continues to amaze us as we see her blossom into a bright and independent young adult!




